Test Scores Available to Art Therapy Training Programs!

Art therapy training programs that are interested in seeing how their graduates performed in specific knowledge areas of the Board Certification exam can now request this information, effective January, 2003. Information will include the mean and standard deviations of the requesting program, the national statistics of the number of graduates who tested during the time frame, and the number of graduates who passed. The test score reports are prepared for individual training programs to make gross comparisons to national groups and other art therapy training programs on a whole. ATCB does not recommend sharing this data with other training programs and it should be emphasized that examinees' names will remain confidential and will not be included in the information sent to any program. If only one or two graduates from a specific program take the exam in any given year, the pass/fail record will not be disclosed because the statistics provided will have been compiled over the previous three-year period.

The ATCB is pleased to be able to provide this service in hopes that it will prove beneficial to the art therapy training programs. To obtain the test score information, a letter of request from an authorized representative of the art therapy training program must be sent to the ATCB National Office. Please note that requests for test scores that are sent via e-mail will not be accepted.

The Newly Revised Standards and Application Process for Registration (Effective Date July 1, 2003)

Keeping in compliance with the education standards set forth by the American Art Therapy Association (AATA), the ATCB has revised the ATR Standards and Application Process for Registration. The new standards will be effective for applications dated on or after July 1, 2003. Two major changes of note are:

- 1.) The number of required semester credit hours in art therapy coursework has changed from 21 to 24.
- 2.) The minimum number of required, supervised practicum hours has increased from 600 to 700.

Please be aware that these important changes were reflected in the AATA Education Standards brochure, effective date July 1, 2002.

As always, the ATCB seeks to develop, administer, and evaluate a program for the registration of Art Therapists as well as an examination for the certification of Art Therapists. The ATCB welcomes all feedback from registrants and certificants and such feedback can be submitted to the ATCB National Office via phone, fax, or email.

ATCB and AATA - Two Parts of a Larger Whole

The physicist David Bohm once wrote, "The tree does not grow from the seed. The seed is rather a kind of aperture through which the tree very gradually emerges; growth is an unfolding process." As President-elect of the American Art Therapy Association, I find myself in dialogue these days with the Art Therapy Credentials Board, working together to create our collective future. The nature of the aperture for this growing process rests in the spirit we bring to the undertaking.

I take a few steps back and consider how far we've come. It is amazing! There is a small tree growing where, not too long ago, the ATCB was only a seed, cast off from something already grown. The beginning was tumultuous as art therapists tried to accept the legal and logistical need to separate the credentialing side of the profession from its organizational structure. This confusion and divisive spirit still lingers when art therapists ask AATA to pursue an agenda that is suited to the ATCB or vice versa. ATCB and AATA are two separate organizations; each with their own boards, managing firms, officers, and web sites. Once a single certainty, now I squint: I see double. With the power of the binocular view, we can see clearly our different roles in the larger profession of art therapy and we need to keep differentiating them. As we do, we become a little more comfortable - for one side is

dedicated to work toward outcomes that demonstrate our common theory, practice, knowledge, and skills while the other side nurtures and advocates for our collective identity. We are gradually settling in with each other, solidifying what we must do with these distinct differences. And so comes change: now solid, we transform again.

The ATCB and AATA are working to make the transition from thinking alone as separate organizations, to thinking together, as two parts of a larger whole. We are two trees sharing the same roots and soil. In my leadership and collaboration with the ATCB, I strive to envision this larger creative cycle and the tremendous potential it offers to us. I see us beginning to take the energy of our differences and channel it towards something that has never been created before. We gain a synergistic power from working together that can sustain a new spirit to penetrate whatever continues to challenge us. I take a further step back, squint again: where once there were two trees, now my vision takes in wholeness - where one large, life-giving tree has sprouted two supple shoots. We are committed to its growth and vitality.
